#### A HEALTHY AND BLESSED BELIEVER L. DISTRESS IL. DELIVERANCE III. DEBT

#### I. The distress experienced (v. 1-3)

- A. This believer knew only comfort in life and death
  - 1. His journey to get there was not comfortable (1-3)
    - a. what occasioned his crying?
    - b. why was this a healthy and blessed reality?
  - 2. To set of on his journey, you need to face your spiritual condition a. study God's x-ray of yourself: Romans 3:10-19
    - b. study till you begin to grasp how great your sins & miseries are!
      - we need to stop *talking and thinking* about ourselves
      - we need to begin *crying and weeping* about ourselves

# II The Deliverance seen and experienced (vs. 4-6)

- A. Poet of Ps. 130 did not stay in dismal depth
  - 1. Holy Spirit's saving work is to lead to salvation
    - a. discovering and convicting of sin is no goal itself but means to lead sinners to feet of Jesus Christ (John 16:14-15)
- B. It was revealed that there is forgiveness with God (vs. 4)
  - 1. This truth is the gem of the Gospel: Exodus 34:6-8
    - a. God's glory is The LORD, the LORD God, merciful, and gracious, longsuffering, and abundant in goodness and truth, keeping mercy for thousands, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin
      - Micah 7:18; Is. 55:7-9
    - b. in Jesus' sacrifice He opened the way to pardon sinners
  - 2. The truth is of God's forgiveness is a struggle to believe (vs. 5-6)
    - a. such a struggle to believe God alone needs to overcome

### III. The debt we owe God

- A. Poet gave expression to his thankfulness to God by encouraging others (7-8)
  - 1. He wrote Psalm not to call attention to himself but to encourage others
    - a. There is hope even if God has marked all your iniquity
    - b. This hope is based on the glorious revelation of God's sovereign grace Rom. 9:15-16 For he saith to Moses, I will have mercy on whom I will have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I will have compassion. So then it is not of him that willeth, nor of him that runneth, but of God that sheweth mercy.
  - 2. Let the redeemed of the LORD join this poet in his praises of vs. 7-8
- B. Poet also expressed his thankfulness to God by walking in the fear of Lord
  - 1. To fear the Lord is to be reverence His will and honor His being (vs. 4)
    - a. Rom 8:12: Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh (Rom. 12:1-2)
  - 2. Fruit of thankfulness expressed in holy living is hallmark of redemption
    - a. Christ comes always with a blessing in each hand: *forgiveness in the one and holiness in the other!*
    - b. Nothing can set aside the evidence of a holy life. It is better than any claim of a revelation from heaven. (W. Plumer)

# Questions to consider and discuss:

- 1. Examine the seven Beatitudes describing the true citizen of Kingdom of heaven in Matt. 5:3-9. Can you see the three aspects of sense of misery, discovery of redemption and the fruit of thankfulness reflected in these marks of the true Christian?
- 2. Are the three aspects of misery, deliverance and gratitude *stages or elements* of genuine spiritual life?
- 3. Is God's ultimate purpose in saving sinners their happiness? If not, what is it then? Which Scriptures can you find to support this?
- 4. Salvation without discipleship is cheap grace. Why is that true?
