Scriptures: Ten Commandments (Deut. 5) – Luke 11:1-13 **Singing:** 60:1-3-140:1-235:1-3-322:1, 4-4313-4

- A. The Christian life is a like a race (1 Cor. 9:24-27)
 - 1. You cannot be a Christian without Jesus Christ
 - a. living separated from Him is being like dead, dry branch
 - b. God has no pleasure that you continue to remain like this
 - c. only when we receive His gift in faith, will we be a real Christian
- B. None can successfully compete in any race without doing the right things.
 - 1. One of main spiritually right things to do is prayer
 - a. Jesus prayed often: Luke 3:21 5:16 6:12 9:18 9:29
 - b. His example is to teach as well as to encourage us

JESUS' TEACHING ON PRAYER I. To occasion II. The Parable III. The Encouragement

I. THE OCCASION OF THE LESSON

- A. The occasion was that the disciples saw and heard their Master pray (vs. 1)
 - 1. Sight convicted them deeply (not sure they *heard* Him pray)
- B. The occasion was their request: *teach us to pray* (vs. 1)
 - 1. Why do we need to ask this?
 - a. because the world is toxic to prayer
 - b. because having all outward things, prayer feels less important
 - c. because guilty conscience hinders prayers
 - d. because we may not know power of prayer
 - e. because we tend to be proud (Me do it!)
 - f. because we often are too lazy

II. THE PARABLE

- A. The problem of the embarrassed and needy (vs. 5-6)
 - 1. Notice *how* this neighbor failed (vs 7)
 - 2. Notice *how* persistent the beggar was (vs. 8)

- B. Jesus' parable has one main point
 - 1. When you pray to God, don't think God is like that 'friend in bed'
 - a. God's character is your greatest encouragement to pray to Him (vs. 13)
 - Ps. 86:5 For thou art good and ready to forgive: and plenteous in mercy unto all that call upon thee!
 - Ps. 72:12 For he shall deliver the needy when he crieth; the poor also, and him that hath no helper
 - 2. God may wait to answer our prayer but never because He does not care

III. The encouragement

- A. The 'ask-seek-knock' is a command that is ongoing
- B. The ask-seek-knock' is like three layers
 - 1. in asking you plead God's promises you know
 - 2. **in seeking** we pray for things we don't have a promise or direction
 - 3. **in knocking** it gets clear who is really serious about seeking!
- C. The encouragement of vs. 11-13 is like Ps. 81:10 *Open thy mouth wide, and I will fill it*

Final take-away: We can all agree on the need for the work of Holy Spirit A. Notice Jesus' assuring promise (vs. 13)

B. But don't forget Jesus' clear direction (vs. 9-10)

Prayer is not the least we can do: it is the most!

We need to people to whom prayer is the first and not the last thing we do.
