Stronger Together THE TRELLIS AND THE VINE

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Introduction: The main purpose and structure of a church community is analogous to a trellis and a vine.

- A. What is the main goal of a local church family (the vine) according to Ps. 80:8-11?
 - 1. To be established in a local area (vs. 8-9)
 - 2. To prosper through growth (vs. 10)
 - 3. To extend into the land to reach others to lead them to God (vs. 11)
- B. Looking through Ps. 80, what has happened to that main goal?
 - 1. God has left them alone: this expression of His anger (3-4)
 - 2. God is allowing them to suffer (vs. 4-5)
 - 3. God is allowing the world to mock and laugh (vs. 6)
 - 4. God is allowing the world to invade (vs. 12-13)
 - 5. God is allowing it to be destroyed from within (vs. 16)

So: the goal hasn't been reached

- C. What does the poet pray for in Ps. 80 to seek a reversal of this condition?
 - 1. For God to shine forth and stir up His strength (vs. 1-2)
 - 2. For God to turn us (vs. 3, 7)
 - 3. For God to visit this vine (vs. 14)
 - 4. For God to raise up 'the man of His right hand' (vs. 17)
- D. The Definition of the Trellis and the Vine
 - 1. Trellis is the *supporting structure of the vine*
 - a. Practically in our church that would be
 - consistory subcommittees (Mission) evangelism programs (Creation Eve, Persecuted Church) small Bible and Prayer groups in home/church Youth Group Boys/Girls' Group Christian School (Boards)
 - b. Dangers:
 - too much trellis and far too little vine: some churches have more organization, procedures, regulations and officers than believers
 - too much vine without supporting trellis: the other extreme is not enough structure and leadership to give guidance and hold accountable
 - 2. Vine is the *living church growing & bearing fruit*
 - a. aim at being a living church: young/old people regenerated to become a living member
 - greatest danger a church faces is not from outside but from inside: a hollowing out by decreasing commitment to God and His Word in our rising generation
 - Albert N. Martin: Every congregation, however soundly the Word may be preached there and

however much spiritual life there may be, is only one generation removed from apostacy. Tis will happen when in a congregation a new generation emerges which no longer knows by experience what the power of Christ's blood and the operation of the Holy Spirit is.

b. aim at being a Gospel growing - Grace community church

- growth in numbers is not our first goal
- status quo is also not our main goal
 - times change and through outside influences and inward hollowing, we need to change to *stay on course*
 - a church that doesn't grow (spiritually) is losing and fossilizing
 - growth always includes change and change can at times be painful or fearful
- aim must be Gospel growth of young/old people
 - Gospel growth is when we grow in the knowledge and joys of the Gospel lived out in a Christ-devoted and Spirit-filled life

c. aim at fruit bearing church

- fruit bearing in personal transformation as we display the 'fruit of the Spirit
- fruit bearing in exporting the Gospel message to others
 - fruit bearing is Kingdom growth in every layer of our lives
- fruit bearing church: where members are disciples who seek to make other disciples of Christ
- E. What needs most concentration in our local church?
 - 1. Strengthening the trellis or the vine?
 - a. the vine: a healthy church is focused on growing the 'vine' and not the trellis
 - good structures don't grow the ministry as no trellis has ever grown a vine!
 - therefore, all our concentration should be on the spiritual growth of the people so they all become laborers in the kingdom of God (Matthew. 9:37-38)
 - 2. Organizing events or growing our people?
 - a. events to attract unbelievers doesn't work (doesn't even attract most of our own)
 - b. when we train up each other to be more vigilant in living the Gospel of Jesus, we become a force for the Kingdom
- F. How do we grow so we may be a Gospel community?
 - 1. Be proactive instead of reactive
 - a. reactive is problem solving and waiting for next problem
 - b. proactive is anticipating the problems and prepare for it
 - 2. Be a Gospel community that nurtures others (derived from D. Tripp)
 - a. seed sown/planted: needs watering weeding tending
 - weeding/watering/tending is community project
 - b. the secret of such a community is not a *plan* but the presence and power of a *Person*
 - the nearer we draw each other to Jesus Christ, the more nurturing we become
 - 3. Be a Gospel community that is humbly honest
 - a. hiding and ignoring sin is allowing 'beast to destroy us'
 - dealing with sin is important and be open to admit sin is even more important
 - b. nothing destroys a church quicker than sin ignored
 - 4. Be a Gospel community that is forgiving and restorative

- a. sin is inevitable when sinners live together
 - instead of gossiping bad-mouthing -sharing we are to put it away thru forgiveness
- b. our tendency is to separate from those who failed us, disagreed with us, or even opposed us
- c. casualties in battle w/ sin/temptations should not be abandoned on the battlefield
- 5. Be a Gospel community that is encouraging
 - a. life is warfare tough full of suffering disappointments
 - b. encouragement is come along side and read/share Scripture and prayer
- 6. Be a Gospel community that shares God's resources
 - a. God views His Church as a body with different organs limbs functions abilities
 - all are uniquely created!
 - G: koinonia for fellowship is partnership (see HCat. Q. 55)
- G. Let's test our thinking: *True or False*
 - 1. Communion of saints it the ideal Christian life
 - a. False: in NT believers 'sharing' is **normal** Christian life it is the bottom line!
 - refer to example of the partnership between Paul and Philippians
 - 2. In NT we don't have spectators and players
 - a. True: NT sees all believers 'players' and each plays distinct role
 - in the body each organ has a task to support the whole
 - 3. To call people 'members of a church' is weakening the NT teaching
 - a. True: in God's kingdom we are not members but partners
 - member: emphasizes that we expect benefits
 - partner: communicates involvement in the work of the King
 - 4. We need only vine-workers and do without the trellis workers
 - a. False: we need both.
 - in the NT we have trellis workers in apostles, pastors, elders, deacons etc.
 - they were foremen organizers guardians mobilizers models
 - yet they are also **partners** or **vine-worker** with special responsibility to care for and equip Others (Eph. 4:12)
 - b. trellis workers also are to provide or nurture the best conditions under which the rest of the Gospel partners can get on with **vine work**
