## JESUS' LAST SERMON BEFORE THE CROSS

I. Do not weep for the Sinless One II. Weep for the sinful ones

## I. Jesus calls us not to weep for Him, the Sinless One

- A. The scenes of Jesus' sufferings are horrific and barbaric
  - 1. His crime was being godly
  - 2. The women's sympathy was heart-warming
- B. Yet Jesus rejected these women's tears (vs. 28): Why?
  - 1. Because these tears are a temptation for Christ
  - 2. Because these tears are *misplaced*
  - 3. Because these add to His suffering
- C. Point for examining
  - 1. Do not make too much when you tear up hearing about Christ's suffering
  - 2. Are we shedding the tears Jesus valued like in Luke 7:38?

## II. Weep for the sinful ones like yourselves and your children

- A. Jesus commands these mothers to weep!
  - 1. Picture Him facing His cross: yet He looked beyond that! (29-31)
  - 2. Taste in these words of a tortured Jesus *His love compassion!*
  - 3. Sensing the near reality Jesus prophesied three startling truths
    - a. the reversed curse of vs. 29
    - b. the preferred fearful of vs. 30
    - c. the somber warning of vs. 31

- B. Jesus' charge to us as parents is to weep!
  - 1. Be mindful: He is not speaking here to **heathen** parents/children!
  - 2. Be awakened: we have every reason to weep!

    a. we and our children are born under the curse (Eph. 2:1-3)
    - b. None knew this reality better than Jesus Himself (Luke 22:39-46)
    - c. With His call to weep, Jesus calls attention to a basic truth: our privileged position does not change our spiritual condition!

## **Two Closing Applications**

A. Are we weeping about ourselves and our children?

B. Is weeping enough saving? Will tears wash away sins or lessen guilt?

O my sad conscience! O my heart! How do their workings clash! One hour I am pained – from sin I smart; The next I am bold and rash.

How can I give up sin so sweet?

I know not what to do.

Death may be near, and I am not fit

To stay, nor yet to go.

Jesus, Thy love is to me unknown, But I have heard Thy Name; O heal, and now look down, And ease me of my pain.

O come to this poor heart that aches, And Thy great salvation brings. Then I shall my sin forsake, And of Thy mercy sing.
